

get some exercise. Alternately, you can join in anywhere along the route. Kids, strollers, and dogs are all very welcome as well!



Town Council Election Coming Up Soon

MEET THE CANDIDATES

Editor's Note: There are two individuals running for one position on the Orchard Park town council in the upcoming November election:

Mike Sherry, incumbent, and Conor Flynn, the challenger. Mike will be on the Republican, Conservative, and Libertarian lines. Conor is endorsed by the Democratic and Working Families parties, and will also be on the Independence line.

Voting takes place on November 5, 2019 (Check online at https://www.elections.erie.gov/early-voting/ for early voting options, beginning October 26, for the first time this year.).

We asked each candidate to write a short summary, outlining their experience and goals, with a particular focus on Eagle Heights. We publish them here, in alphabetical order.

Conor Flynn

My name is Conor Flynn and I want to be your next councilman in the Town of Orchard Park. I am a Village resident with my wife, Ann Dillon, and dog, Nana. I am also an attorney with experience negotiating contracts with large industry players. I am running for this position to offer a fresh perspective that focuses on what families, young and old, want to see in their community and in local government.

After speaking with residents, I have three main goals for the Town of Orchard Park over the next four years.

First, I want to help increase taxpayer's access to their local government, which will help improve transparency and accountability. I believe there has been a breakdown of communication between the Town government and taxpayers on a few recent occasions. Orchard Park residents are busy people and need their government to take a more active role in keeping them informed. This means that the Town will have to be more proactive in using technology, including the Town website, email lists, and social media, to keep residents apprised of what the Town is doing.

Second, I want to help plan for a new generation of Orchard Park residents. Data from the U.S. Census Bureau shows that Orchard Park is losing out to neighboring communities in the 25 to 35 year old demographic. Considering this is when college-educated families put down their roots, buy a long-term home, and start having children, the Town must work in lockstep with its Village and other stakeholders to ensure that Orchard Park is a destination community for the young families who will become the tax base over the next 30 years. This will take careful planning, a review of current planning policies and zoning codes, and building Youth and Planning Boards that help provide a fresh perspective to long-term Town planning issues. As someone who will turn 30 in 2020, I believe I am uniquely qualified to help lead this effort.

Third, I want to help improve Town services where possible. The most immediate of these concerns is with brush pickup and

removal. We are currently testing a beta version of a brush pickup request form on our website, www.voteflynn.org. Town residents can submit requests for brush pickup using this form, and then we will submit these requests to the town. If the beta version proves to be successful, we hope to expand this to a broader range of Town services over the next four years.

I also look forward to working with Eagle Heights residents on their frequent power outages. Currently, Eagle Heights residents have little leverage with NYSEG, who is responsible for maintaining the foliage around the lines. The Town should consider creating leverage with a Community Choice Aggregation program, which puts control of choosing energy supply in local hands.

Mike Sherry

"We know that where community exists, it confers upon its members' identity, a sense of belonging, and a measure of security ... Communities are the ground-level generators and preservers of values and ethical systems" (John Gardner).

As I thought about how to shape an article for a particular community about myself, I found that this quote captures my vision of and for Orchard Park. Consistently rated by various organizations as one of the highest quality-of-life and safest places to live in New York State, on top of having one of the lowest tax rates in Erie County, Orchard Park is, and I want to see it remain, a unique *community*.

I've written a number of articles about the place of community in my life, value-system, and as a member of the town board. To this day community represents one of my most fundamental values. It informs, guides, and determines my political worldview and work. Having moved into our community when I was a child, as an adult I've served Orchard Park in the Windom Fire Company, the Orchard Park Police Department, and for the past six years as a member of the town board.

By way of education and thirty years' experience in supervision and management, I'm all about "service" – leadership, concentrating especially on operations, continuous improvement, and strategic planning. My starting point is always those I'm

called to serve – their needs, desires, and values – and not the imposition of my own. Thus, I prefer to engage citizens, groups, and neighborhoods within our community, doing the hard work of assessing and making the best determinations together in matters that impact them. Neighborhood examples would include the lead in the Eagle Ridge basketball courts and ECRT rail-trail disputes, and supporting roles in the playground and power outage issues.

Within the Town Board, I continue efforts to incorporate widely used performance-enhancing best business practices, as well as greater transparency, openness, and accountability. Still serving as the Town Board's project manager for the Community Activities Center, having facilitated a first of its kind strategic plan for town government, and an assessment of the police department, work is about to begin with the highway department. The goal is always the same, namely, greater efficiency and effectiveness. Once this is

finished, I hope to develop full strategic plans *with* these two departments. In the spring or summer 2020, it will be time to update the strategic plan for the town government, and I also want to pursue some environmental initiatives.

Endorsed by the Republican, Conservative, and Libertarian parties, I have also been endorsed by the Orchard Park Police Benevolent and Command Officers Associations, as well as the Civil Service Employees Association (CSEA). These endorsements are not owing to politics – something I have little interest in – but because of my familiarity with and commitment to serving our community, that is, to preserving its values and identity, and strengthening a sense of belonging and security for all.

I want to sincerely "thank you" for this opportunity to speak from the heart, and I hope to continue to serve you for the next several years.


Chances are when you pass 1 Fir Top Drive, Sadie will be out in the front yard quietly observing, except when she sees a fox. Then she won't stop barking!

Senior Wishes FULFILLING THE HEART'S DESIRE



Tell us about your heart's desire. That's the headline of the brochure for Senior Wishes, a program dedicated to celebrating seniors by providing them with experiences to be cherished and remembered. Founded by the United Church Home Society in 2013 and currently, in its sixth year, the group has granted wishes for over 200 seniors. The local nonprofit's mission is to fulfill wishes that may have been set aside by qualifying seniors, for any number of reasons.

A wish can be any meaningful experience the recipient deeply desires and that they can't fulfill on their own. Perhaps it's tickets to the theater or to cheer on a favorite team where Senior Wishes handles the logistics involving transportation or wheelchair and oxygen accommodations. It could be supplies and lessons to reconnect with a hobby set aside to raise a family. Or it could even be a visit to a distant loved one the senior hasn't been able to see in years. Whatever the wish, Senior Wishes wants to hear about it.

According to Wendy Miller Backman, Senior Wishes Executive Director, "Senior Wishes was created to foster respect and appreciation by providing seniors with a life-enriching experience to be remembered. These are people who have spent their lives serving our country, caring for others, volunteering in the community and raising their families. We want them to know they are not forgotten."

Having been a volunteer for Senior Wishes in a variety of capacities for the past few years, I can attest to the fact that it has an enormous impact on both the wish recipient and the volunteers. We've helped bring together families long separated by distance and financial ability for something as simple as a family dinner. And we've afforded others the chance to learn a new skill (painting), hone an old one (photography) or to do something they would never have been able to do on their own (go on a sleigh ride).

My favorite, though, was the trip we took to the KeyBank Center with three gentlemen – all military veterans — who lived in the same assisted living facility. Their wish was simple — they wanted to go to a hockey game together. Well, they got that opportunity and so much more. It was for them (and us!) — an incredible afternoon. The Sabres treated them like the VIPs they were and rolled out the red carpet. They met players old and new, they were outfitted with jerseys, and they were featured on the Jumbotron, to give you an idea of what a special outing it was.

eagle heights history

Halloween in eagle heights

Tricks, Treats, And Traditions







F or neighborhood kids, Halloween is almost as important as Christmas. In recent years the adults have made decorating for Halloween a major endeavor, rivaling Christmas decorations. Eagle Heights has had changing traditions on Halloween night.

Eagle Heights and Ties to Salem Witches

The first settler of Eagle Heights, Seth Abbott, came in 1807 from New England. The family landed in the Boston area in 1638. In the Abbott family's past was a rather embarrassing situation that haunted the family. In 1692, Nehemiah Abbott was accused of being a demonic witch. He was one of about 20 tried in the famous Salem witch trials. A young girl accused Nehemiah Abbott, her neighbor, of being a demon. She claimed she saw him disappear into a cloud, and soon after she fell into a spell or trance.

Nehemiah Abbott went to trial in Salem and was the only accused witch to be found not guilty. Many were executed. Three of the accused were tortured and died in attempts to have them confess to witchcraft. One of the accused was drowned and two were crushed by rocks. Abbott refused to confess and made a very logical defense using Puritan religious principles. A book on the Salem witch trials said he employed "great dignity and earnestness, splendid common sense" in his defense.

Another Abbott, Benjamin (1661-1703), was an Andover, MA, leader. After a property dispute, Martha Carrier placed a seven-year curse on Benjamin and he claims he became sick. Abbott accused her of witchcraft, as did others. Martha was found guilty and was hung in 1692, but local resentment and suspicion forced the Abbotts to move to Vermont. Years later, Seth and Samuel moved to Eagle Heights.

A Local Witch

In the early 1990s, a woman on Knob Hill claimed to be a witch -- a good witch. *Honest*. She was an artist who painted very large canvases of thunderstorms. She used white pancake makeup and wore dark flowing long dresses and capes. She would walk the street with her arms stretched out, so that wind caught her cape. Her claim, expressed in a friendly pleasant voice, was that she was a ... "white witch." A white witch is a believer of witchcraft who subscribes to a belief that witchcraft is not bad or evil. They believe in healing and nature. It is not true that there were two cars and a broom in her garage.

Murder and Triple Hanging

Just south, and adjacent to Redbrick and Hearthstone, was (is) the tiny hamlet of Loveland. In 1825, the Thayer family, a father and his three sons, worked in the brickyard hauling bricks with







their two big oxen. One was called *God All Mighty* and the other *Jesus Christ*. The three Thayers – Nelson, Israel, and Isaac – had terrible reputations, but owned much land south to Boston, NY.

The newspaper articles and history of this particular incident are vague on facts, such as the location, but are extensive on sensationalism. The Thayers made the acquaintance of John Love, a notorious loan shark and con man. Love was known to swindle land. The Thayers owed a great deal of money to Love and called him to their cabin in December 1824 where they shot him in the head and then struck him with an ax.

After a while, Love was missed by his creditors and a \$10 reward was offered. The Thayers were suspects since they were trying to collect on Love's loans. In February 1825, John Love's body was found in a very shallow gave, probably near Redbrick or Stone Bluff Ct. It seems the ground was frozen, and the Thayers could not cover the body's left hand. The Thayer father and three sons were tried and convicted of murder. The jury carefully debated the Thayer's fate and found them guilty in thirty minutes. They were to be executed.

For some reason, the father was released but was made to watch his three sons hang in Niagara Square in Buffalo on June 7, 1825. The Thayer execution was the only public execution held in Erie County. The newspaper claims 20,000 to 30,000 people watched the triple hanging. This attendance seems very far-fetched. No one has reported seeing a ghost in Eagle Heights ... yet.

Halloween in Eagle Heights Has Changed

For Eagle Heights' kids, Halloween may be second to Christmas in excitement. This is not new, but what is a new trend is that Halloween decorations such as lighting, displays, etc. are now rivaling Christmas decorations. Another major Halloween change is the number of kids out trick or treating and that there are no longer many tricks. Last Halloween we had about 20 kids come to our door. In 1975 to 1985, we would have 125! Liz Widman, grew up on Pawtucket, and now lives on Briar Hill, recalls having over 300 Halloween visitors in 1986.

Past Halloween Tricks

In the past, two to three nights before Halloween, the tricks would start. If you had a young teenage girl in your house, the tricks were more frequent. At dusk, as a car approached, boys would stretch and hold an imaginary rope across the road. The driver would come to a sharp stop, and the boys would run.

"Ding Dong Ditch" was ringing a doorbell and then running off. A little more harmful was to start a small porch leaf fire around some dog poo, ring the doorbell, and hide to see the homeowner stamp out the fire and return to the house.

Pumpkin smashing was an event for the timid kids. Residents would call the police, but the police response was slowed since the older kids would rotate the street signs, and the police would be lost in Eagle Heights (no GPS).

Today, homeowners decorate their homes with orange lights. In days gone by kids decorated other homes with white toilet paper. In addition, shaving cream and eggs were the tricks of choice. I have conducted extensive interviews with the Eagle Heights' youths of the '80s and '90s to better understand the historic Halloween empirical rituals of Eagle Heights at that time. What follows is a confession from a reformed youth. Only to give the confession authenticity I will give the young lads initials: adampawlak.

"Growing up in Eagle Heights during the 1980s was nothing short of spectacular. But Halloween was downright epic. Your costume was important, but it didn't matter nearly as much as the crew you were with and the arsenal of ammo you were carrying in your pillowcase that held all the loot. In fact, getting ready for the big night meant securing the means to your very survival ... lots of eggs and modifying the shaving cream nozzles so they sprayed strong and far. The battles were fought going door to door and pumpkins were smashed as retribution. We were increasingly covered with "battle scars" as the night wore on.

Once your pillowcase was empty of your preferred means of kid warfare and full of the candy that would last for months, you

knew it was time for the last stop of the night. And that was at the Nemec's haunted house on venerable Knob Hill. The family of 14 kids hosted and treated an entire neighborhood to amazing pumpkin carvings and displays on the outside and wicked treats and refreshments on the inside. The Nemec house was a Halloween marvel that showcased a maze of the most spectacular and scariest things that defined the holiday. Once we had our fill, we'd all go home, wash off the night and go through the mounds of treats and begin the trading for your favorite morsels.

The day after, you would go outside and survey the damage as everyone's Dad was asking, "Where in the hell is the shaving cream?" and our Moms were looking for missing eggs and toilet paper. As you were getting the tongue lashing and receiving punishment from Mom and Dad about all your shenanigans you engaged in the night before, you couldn't help but think to yourself, "Totally worth it! Eagle Heights. Simply the best."

Other youths of the early '80s have confessed to taking one egg from the refrigerator once a week, starting about Labor Day, in preparation for Halloween. The one egg would not be missed and by Halloween, the eggs had rotted. Another anonymous 13-year-old boy confesses to emptying a can of shaving cream on Julie Sheehan's head (Now Julie Jones on Pawtucket). Brian Peters apologizes. Two girls confessed to secretly wishing the boys would spray them with shaving cream, and that they would be devastated if the boys ignored them. Dr. Sheehan (Pine Terrace) was a dentist and gave out toothbrushes and not candy on Halloween.

Current Traditions

Sally and Lyle Roberts on Fawn Terrace have been offering Halloween drinks for many, many years. Their house is dimly lit in shadows and spooky music plays. Sally and Lyle are in elaborate costumes and offer several drinks. Offerings include hot spiced cider, cold cider, and a nicely spiked cider for adults. Some years they have 100 guests and not all arrive with kids!

In recent years the Meehan and Boystak families decorate a trailer with lights, hay, jack-o-lanterns, etc, and take the kids for rides.

For several years a well used, discarded toilet was moved in the moonlight from one lawn to another. Finally, it was shipped to the home of a former EH resident in New Hampshire, only to be shipped back to EH the next Halloween.

You Have been Booed!

A relatively new Halloween tradition is to be "booed" by the Phantom Ghost. A friend will place a small gift at your door, ring the bell, and run. You are to reciprocate or simply be thankful. You could always Boo someone new to EH or someone with no local family.




Why is Halloween so Popular?







Most likely you would do an interview and write the article, but you may also ask fellow students to write about themselves, just editing and submitting the article to us.

COMFORT FOOD FOR A FALL DAY MINESTRONE SOUP

I love learning about the history of food and today it's minestrone, from the Italian minestra for "soup" or minestrare, "to serve soup." This dish originated in the port city of Genoa, Italy, where thousands of ships from all over the world docked each year. There they found small, floating restaurants called "catrai," which served steamy bowls of minestrone to the sailors. It was a great comfort to them after long periods of eating crackers and salted fish. Of course, there are many versions of this soup, but this recipe is easy to make.

There are many "rules" for making this soup, depending on the area of Italy, such as using only semolina pasta or adding a Parmesan rind halfway through cooking. The finishing touch, according to the Genoese, is a drizzle of pesto once the soup is in the bowl. Pesto must not boil in order to release its "raw" fragrance. Of course, grated Parmesan cheese and crusty bread are great additions.

Ingredients

4T. olive oil

1 medium onion, chopped

2 celery ribs, chopped

2 cloves garlic, crushed

2t. oregano

1 pkg. frozen mixed vegetables

1/2 pkg. frozen chopped spinach (de-

frosted and squeezed dry)
1 small can crushed tomatoes (12 oz.)

6 cups chicken stock

1 bay leaf

 $1\,\mathrm{cup}$ cannellini beans, drained

 $1/3~{\rm cup}~{\rm small}~{\rm pasta}~({\rm dry})$

Pesto and parmesan cheese (optional)

Instructions

Heat oil. Sauté onions and celery, 10 min. until soft. Add vegetable mix, garlic and oregano. Cook 2 minutes more. Add crushed tomatoes, chicken stock, and bay leaf. Cook 15 minutes. Add pasta, cannellini beans, and spinach. Simmer 20 minutes more.


Another Great Neighborhood Get-Together! Knob Hill had another successful block party on August 30, 2019.



ver the next four to five years, the Ash trees of Eagle Heights will be gone. Ash trees will die from emerald ash borer, a beetle. Foresters estimate that four to seven percent of Eagle Heights (EH) trees are Ash. Chances are you have several on your property.

An Ash tree is a deciduous green leaf tree that tends to grow straight, with a large umbrella crown that provides deep shade. A mature Ash is about 50 feet tall and 20" in diameter. Once infected, a tree dies in about five years.

There is a treatment that will save a tree. However, unless treated several years ago it is now probably too late

to save your Ash tree.

About twenty years ago an invasive beetle came to Michigan and immediately began infecting ash trees. The beetle first came to EH about seven years ago. It is unlikely any of the EH Ash trees will survive.





Now is the time to determine if your infected Ash tree will do damage if it falls. Will the fallen tree knock down power lines, hit a house, or block a driveway? Winter, with the ground frozen, is the time to remove the dead or dying ash tree, before it falls and causes damage.

Sadly, on any casual drive on EH streets, you will see several dying Ash trees.



When leaving Eagle Heights, turn right and drive straight, 46 miles through picturesque and hilly farms, to Letchworth State Park. The 14,000-acre park, called the Grand Canyon of the East, was named by *USA Today* as the country's best state park. The fall foliage is now at its peak, so it is a great time to visit.

The 17-mile long park, with great roads, follows the Genesee River through a 550-foot deep gorge or canyon. There are more than 50 waterfalls, with three being especially high. One waterfall has a 350-foot drop. As a comparison, Niagara Falls is a 167-foot drop. The park has all the services you would expect of a state park – picnic areas, cabins, 66 miles of marked hiking trails, swimming, nature tours, etc. Google for all the details.

Stop for lunch at the rustic Glen Iris Inn, near a major waterfall – great food, wine, and a super view. They also have rooms if you want to stay overnight. The Glen Iris Inn closes November 3 and opens again in April. There are also three snack stands in the park and a small grocery store. Check it out soon!

Among the oldest girls' schools in the U.S., SEM has created a constantly innovating culture of achievement, scholarship, creativity, and leadership since 1851.

Our school, on the National Register of Historic Places, is a unique, cozy, urban campus. Secular and non-uniform, our independent day and boarding school environment allows girls to challenge themselves, express themselves, and prepare for college and productive, meaningful adulthoods.

While many girls' schools are founded in a particular faith, our independent school culture is centered around our academic and social honor code. Each fall, we have a signing ceremony in which every student and faculty member pledges to conduct themselves with honor and respect. Our entire school starts the day together singing in a morning meeting.





Traditions like the honor code, morning meeting, and commencement connect us to generations of SEM women. Perhaps, the most unique of our traditions is Hornet-Jacket. SEM students are engaged not only academically but with community, culture, and sports. 61% of our students play at least one sport. 100% of our students participate in community service through partnerships with agencies and nonprofits like Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper, St. Luke's Mission of Mercy, Ronald McDonald House, and WEDI's ENERGY and FLY tutoring programs for refugee and immigrant children.

SEM is steps away from the Albright-Knox and Burchfield Penney art galleries, Delaware Park, and shops and restaurants (including Starbucks, Ashker's, Talking Leaves Books, and the Lexington Co-Op). Our residences are renovated historic homes next door to our school. Our playing field -- Larkin Field -- is a few short, tree-lined blocks away. We sail out of the Buffalo Yacht Club and row from the new BSRA boathouse on Ohio Street.

At SEM, we believe in standards but not standardization. Our curriculum is advanced and responsive. While some schools are beginning to drop Regents testing, we have never participated in them. SEM girls are encouraged to find their best selves while pursuing their interests at SEM, all in small classes. Seated in the round, at Harkness tables for seminar-style learning, no voice is lost at SEM.

Our oldest tradition is *forward-thinking*...about the potential of girls. SEM is committed to STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and design, and mathematics) education for girls, addressing the dearth of women in those majors and careers. Our four-year computer science curriculum, VR lab (virtual reality) and freshman STEAM courses introduce girls to the knowledge and experience they will need to thrive in the global economy.

But, of course, we also have a robust humanities and arts program, dozens of extracurricular clubs and activities, and sports teams. With 10 pianos on campus, we recently committed to becoming a rare Steinway Select School. Our theater productions are entirely performed by girls. Our arts teachers are active professionals in their disciplines.

Originally a boarding school at our founding 1851, SEM reestablished boarding in 2008. We offer five- and seven-day residential opportunities in the four historic homes adjacent to the school. All are centered around a private courtyard and connected to the school building. More doing, less driving for girls and parents! For some families, our five-day residential program is ideal. Students get full participation in extracurriculars and have supervised study during the week, and families get the best of their daughters for the weekend.

Our environment allows girls to challenge themselves, express themselves, to succeed in college, and prepare for adulthood. Students who thrive at SEM are ready to widen their perspectives, contribute to their community, to explore, to stretch, and to learn.

Graduates of SEM find sisterhood for life, with a network of alumnae on every continent. (Though no one is in permanent residence at the South Pole,



our graduates have worked there!) SEM girls are well-rounded! Our aim is to graduate informed citizens, and creative, independent, thinkers, who are well-positioned for remarkable futures.




